



THE UNVOICED COMMUNITY: BBQ MEN & WOMEN OF GOULDS

For more than 50 years, the barbeque vendors of Goulds, a town in Southwest Miami Dade County, have not only sold great barbeque, they've become a vital part of the place's spirit and culture. The photo-documentary exhibit, "The Unvoiced Community: BBQ Men & Women of Goulds," winner of a 2016 Knight Foundation Arts Challenge, uncovers this hidden gem. Goulds resident and multidisciplinary artist, Symone Titania Major, presents photographs and recordings of these passionate, opinionated entrepreneurs, as they share their thoughts on cooking, social issues, and the evolution of their town. For a real taste of Goulds, come by the porch on Sunday, November 12 for our grand opening and some famous barbeque!



HURRICANE

A photography installation of largescale photographs by Barry Fellman that transform devastation into art, "Hurricane" commemorates the 25th anniversary of Hurricane Andrew, the most damaging hurricane to hit the U.S. in nearly a century. "Hurricane" shows the drama and chaos wreaked by the category five storm through powerful, bold images, most never seen before. A coffee table book with the same title will be presented at the Fair. Hurricane (the book) features essays by New York Times photography critic Vicki Goldberg, and then WTVJ-NBC chief meteorologist, Bryan Norcross, "the man who talked South Florida through" the Great Hurricane of 1992.

WYNWOOD COLORING BOOK: THE 2ND EDITION

The Wynwood Coloring Book, second edition, features 44 street artists from the world-famous Wynwood Art district in Miami. If you haven't tried coloring yet, you'll see what a stress-reliever it is. Artist and social entrepreneur Diego Orlandini has developed Aimful Coloring Books, a series featuring urban art. With the support of the Live Aimfully Foundation, every copy of the Aimful Coloring Books series that is sold results in the distribution of a textbook to a child in need. 



OJALÁ/INSHALLAH: WISHES FROM THE MUSLIM WORLD

Miami Book Fair's sister program, MDC Live Arts, announces their 2017-18 Season: Ojalá/Inshallah: Wishes from the Muslim World. The Spanish world "ojalá" means "I wish" or "I hope so" and derives its meaning from the Arabic phrase "inshallah" or "God willing." The word is a reminder of the Moorish impact on Spanish language and Hispanic identity, and represents the crosscultural exchange central to the season, which has been designed to challenge widespread assumptions concerning Muslim identity. Check mdclivearts.org for the full line up of programs spanning music, theater, dance, spoken word and more!

In the spirit of Ojalá/Inshallah, Miami Book Fair has invited several authors writing about topics pertinent to the Muslim world: Yasmine El Rashidi, Chronicle of a Last Summer: A Novel of Egypt; Aliyyah Eniath, The Yard; Haroon Moghul, How to Be a Muslim: An American Story; Laleh Khadivi, A Good Country; Khizr Khan, An American Family: A Memoir of Hope and Sacrifice; Adam Valen Levinson, The Abu Dhabi Bar Mitzvah: Fear and Love in the Modern Middle East; and Abdurraqib, They Can't Kill Us Until They Kill Us.

DE GROOT LITERARY PRIZE

The Miami Book Fair, in partnership with the De Groot Foundation, will announce the winner of the 2017 Miami Book Fair/ De Groot Prize for the Novella, awarded to exceptional fiction of 17,500–40,000 words. The MBF/De Groot prize offers the winner a cash award of \$6,000 and publication of their novella by Melville House. The winner will be hosted in Miami during next year's 35th anniversary edition of the Fair, where they will be honored and participate in various readings and programs. The submission period for the 2018 award begins May, 2018. Check miamibookfair.com for details.



PAZ PRIZE FOR POETRY

Sponsored by the Miami Book Fair, and in partnership with the National Poetry Series, the Paz Prize for Poetry is given biannually to a poetry collection written in Spanish by a poet living in the U.S. The winner receives a cash award, translation of their work into English, and publication by Akashic Books. The 2016 Paz Prize winner, Legna Rodriguez Iglesias, will participate in various programs highlighting her winning collection, *Miami Century Fox*, during this year's Fair.
